He had primary pulmonary hypertension as well as an atrial septal defect in his heart.

## Linda Tollakson's Transplant Story

Linda Tollakson forwarded 2 articles that appeared in *The Western Guard* that featured her lung transplant experience. Linda lives in western Minnesota near the town of Dawson.

She suffered from COPD and on February 17, 2009 received a double lung transplant.

On February 3rd, 2009, she and her husband Roger, came to Minneapolis for an ap-

pointment the next day at the Transplant Center. On the morning of February 4th, Roger had difficulty waking her and she was taken unconscious by ambulance to Fairview University Hospital. Linda was suffering from high carbon dioxide level and was put on a ventilator. She remained unconscious until a week after the transplant surgery.

Linda says she was quite confused when she regained consciousness and learned that she had undergone surgery. Since the transplant, she has some leg weakness but is grateful to have received the gift of life.

## Doing Less With Less?

The Minnesota Council of Non-Profits just completed a day long conference titled “Thriving in the New Normal”. One of the presenters talked about non-profits having to do less with less support due to the economy. Hope Chest News has 1 major fund raiser (the golf tournament) and 4 bake sales to raise funds. Donations are the only other source of dollars to help support those in need. The bulk of the work and support is from a core group of folks located in the Twin Cities. The 80-20 rule applies to Hope Chest News as well. 80% of the support and contributions come from 20% of the members.

## Transplant Center Profile



Dr. Maryam Valapour

Dr. Maryam Valapour is an Assistant Professor in both the Department of Medicine and the Center for Bioethics. She received her undergraduate degree in biology in 1988 from Charleston Southern University. In 1995, she completed her medical training at the Medical University of South Carolina. She spent a year as an Intern at Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia and served as a Resident in internal medicine there until 1998. Dr. Valapour was a Fellow in Bioethics and Health Policy at John Hopkins University in Baltimore. Also, from 1998 to 2002 she was a Fellow in Pulmonary and

Critical Care at John Hopkins. She came to the University of Minnesota in 2002 as an Assistant Professor at both the Center for Bioethics and the Department of Medicine. While here, Dr. Valpour has maintained an interest in medical ethics with regard to organ transplantation and organ allocation. In the Transplant Center, her focus is the evaluation of lung transplant candidates and the ongoing care of lung recipients.

Dr. Valapour is also a candidate to receive a Masters Degree in Public Policy from the Hubert H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs. She also has been a mentor to students interested in organ allocation.

In her free time, Dr. Valapour enjoys travel.

3. Carers and friends of those who had a lung transplant are also invited to share their unique and difficult duties as a carer. (I have experience as recipient and carer.)
4. Stories may be written by the recipient, a family member, friend or other person, if someone is not comfortable in writing their story. I am also able to write their story.

There are steps to follow in submitting stories, but easy to follow and I am always available by email or phone if anyone has questions.

5. The covers of the book will be designed by two of the contributors of the book. Original artwork only – photos, paintings, etc.

Profits from the book, once I recoup my expenses for publishing the book, will be divided among organizations, groups, both transplant and donor side, and research projects pertaining to lung transplant. The contributors of the stories will decide these organizations.

There are two ways in which one can learn about the process. The steps are listed at the new Facebook Group Site I created. (I will list that below). In the DISCUSSIONS section of the group site, are all the steps. Or, I can send personal emails to persons interested. If someone does not have a computer, mail, phone can communication can be arranged.

### Medicare Part D Rebate

A \$250 rebate payment will be made to those on Medicare who have entered the part D drug coverage gap (doughnut hole) in 2010. The payments will start going out in June. The payment will be issued automatically to those that qualify.

### U Researchers Receive Grants To Improve Transplant Survival Rate

Dr. Chris Wendt and Dr. Marshall Hertz lead research aimed at improving transplant survival rates. 65% live longer than 5 years but rejection can be a major problem for some. 2 grants will fund research to predict rejection earlier.

### New Therapies for Cystic Fibrosis

A recent article by Bruce Jancin in *Chest Physician* explains some promising therapies that are emerging for CF. Among the more promising are

- Modifiers of the CF transmembrane conductance regulator (CFTR )
- Airway surface liquid enhancers
- Osmotic therapy
- Anti-inflammatory agents
- Inhaled antimicrobials

- Gene therapy

Gene therapy has proven to be more difficult and complicated than researchers originally thought. The only clinical trial involves 100 patients in England.

Dr. Philip Marcus noted “Cystic fibrosis, an illness well understood mechanistically, has remained difficult to treat. We have been able to extend the life of those with the disease into early adulthood, primarily by the use of better antibiotics and mucus clearing agents.”

### FDA Rejects Drug Treatment For Pulmonary Fibrosis

InterMune, Inc. announced that it the FDA refused to approve pirfenidone, its experi-

mental drug for use in treating idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis. At a meeting on March 9, the FDA advisory committee voted to recommend approval of the drug.

The FDA asked for new clinical trials to prove that the drug works. The denial could keep the drug off of the market for years. Initial trials had shown promise for the drug.

Had it been approved, pirfenidone would have been the first drug available to treat idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis. The rejection by FDA most likely means that it may be years before the drug might be approved.

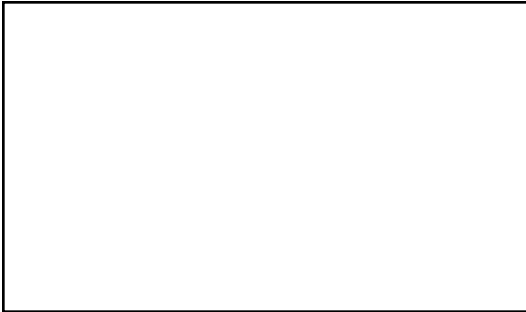
